It's About Trust

Then Jesus told him, because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed. John 20:29

Once I was listening to a teaching by the late Rev Fred Price. During his sermon he held up his Bible and asked the audience in a crowded auditorium, *Do*

you believe this is a Bible? And all who could clearly see that the book had Holy Bible inscribed on it, said, Yes. The Rev Price responded, You don't have to believe it because you can see it.

In our world of new inventions

and technological advances, we're asked continually to believe before we see. In the news this past week, I learned that immediately following a celebration of the Kansas City Chiefs Super Bowl parade, there was a mass shooting.

FOR WE

Seriously, another senseless act of violence, I thought. Can this be brought under control? Yet we're asked to believe gun violence can be curtailed. There are other issues which we're called to believe can be fixed — like homelessness, inflation, or that peace can come where there is war. That's a great deal of believing without seeing. In the text above, Jesus said to Thomas, Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have be-

lieved.

Why would those who haven't seen be more blessed? That doesn't make sense, because seeing isn't connected to believing?

However, Jesus says true faith is belief without seeing, first based on trust. Because

only a select few of his disciples saw him after the resurrection, millions more would have had to rely on blind faith and trust.


So far, over the past months, we, as people of faith, have had to trust without seeing on many occasions, trusting in the power of prayer after hearing heart-wrenching news or physicians' reports.

Keep in mind: There's one thing we have that the faithless do not, and that is *trust in God*. In March we'll celebrate the resurrection of Christ although we didn't see it. Yet we

Lincoln Park Selected for Top UMC's Discipleship Award

Back on November 18, as part of the Conference, **District Superintendent Evelyn Kent-Clark** went around the room asking church leaders what stood out in their minds as highlights for their churches during 2023. New ministries, peach and strawberry festivals, and mission projects were among common items shared. While Lincoln Park leaders highlighted similar areas of our ministry, it apparently was when we noted adding 23 persons

to our membership rolls and having three baptisms from July 1 to mid-November that we caught the attention of DS Kent-Clark. She took her feelings to the conference cabinet where it was fully supported and submitted to the Discipleship Ministries for inclusion with other UMC

Conferences One Matters Awards.

Pastor Quentin received a phone call from our **District Superintendent Evelyn Kent-Clark** who had questions about our profession of faith (in this case, new members) and baptism numbers. A few days later he received another call from her, telling him that Lincoln Park had received the **ONE MATTERS AWARD** for the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference.

This membership-driven award is given to **only one church** in each conference annually by Discipleship Ministries of the Board of Discipleship of the United Methodist Church. As part of the award, our church will receive a plaque and a \$1,000 check. Our District Superintendent confirmed that she'll personally make the presentation at our church.

Andrew "Andy" Krpata, Lincoln Park's Associate Pastor from 1998 to 2002, said:

Under the provisions of the Discipline, I am blessed to have served 27 years cumu*latively in full-time ministry* and retire only to continue in my call to the church as a

pastoral coach (akin to life coaching.) My personal life mission is to grow people into the fullness of who they are.

Andy's first year in the ministry was in the North Carolina Conference before he came into the Eastern PA Conference and was assigned to Lincoln Park. After serving here, he was assigned to Roxborough Ridge Avenue Church in Philadelphia. He later served at Emilie in Levittown, Wesley in Bethlehem, and since July 2019, Andy has been the Senior Pastor at Lehman Memorial Church in Hatboro.

Pastor Andy was instrumental in this endeavor and got the service up and running, Linda said. He worked with Senior Pastor Larry (Carl) to coordinate the theme and sermon of each service, and decided on music, prayers, and other details while serving as worship leader."

The initial contemporary band, now known as the Praise Band, included: Pastor Andy, Lindsey Villecco, and Linda as singers; Melinda Karpata, Andy's wife on piano; Kevin Villecco on drums; Chad Chelius on guitar; and Mark Villecco on bass. Linda says: Our first worship service was in the spring of 2002.
